

Table for Broadband Funding Opportunities for State and Local Government

This information was gathered in part from the [BroadbandUSA](#) website, a component of the [National Telecommunications and Information Administration](#), under the United States Department of Commerce, and from the respective commissions and departments associated with each grant or funding opportunity.

This table is designed to be an interactive list with hyperlinks providing more information for the user. The first column lists the program and provides hyperlinks to the agency or group that runs the program. The description gives a cursory overview. The link provided in the BroadbandUSA column links to a very helpful PDF for each program. The additional commentary and resources column houses links to additional information that was not easily navigable on the program or agency's website, or other information I happened across.

Some of the programs are specifically designed to address broadband expansion or infrastructure, but not all of them. Many programs listed below are meant to apply to anything within the scope of the program's intended purpose and that could include broadband. Those programs specifically created for or that have components largely addressing broadband have been noted with an asterisk.

New Markets Tax Credit Program	Through the New Markets Tax Credit Program, the CDFI Fund allocates tax credit authority to Community Development Entities (CDEs) through a competitive application process. CDEs are financial intermediaries through which private capital flows from an investor to a qualified business located in a low-income community. CDEs use their authority to offer tax credits to investors in exchange for equity in the CDE. Using the capital from these equity investments, CDEs can make loans and investments to businesses operating in low-income communities on better rates and terms and more flexible features than the market. In exchange for investing in CDEs, investors claim a tax credit worth 39% of their original CDE equity stake, which is claimed over a seven-year period. E-Rate Program*	The Schools and Libraries Universal Service Support Program, commonly known as the E-Rate Program, helps schools and libraries obtain affordable broadband. Eligible schools, school districts, and libraries may apply individually or as part of a consortium. Funding may be requested under two categories of service: category one services to a school or library (telecommunications, telecommunications services and Internet access), and category two services that deliver Internet access within schools and libraries (internal connections, basic maintenance of internal connections, and managed internal broadband services). Discounts for support depend on the level of poverty and whether the school or library is located in an urban or rural area. The discounts range from 20 percent to 90 percent of the costs of eligible services. E-rate program funding is based on demand up to an annual Commission-established cap of \$4.15 billion.
